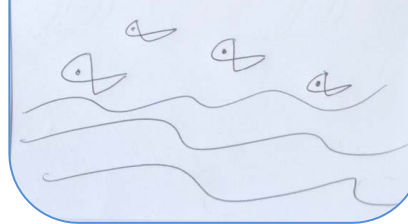

Suir River Café



A place and time to celebrate and create a shared vision for the River Suir

Suir River Café was a collaborative project where we set up a cafe for 10 days as part of the local Clonmel Junction Festival during July 2011. The café acted as a focal point and for all with an interest in the Suir River: the public, local authorities and a diverse range of groups to engage and share their various interests in the river: fishing, boating, river-related sports and recreation, nature appreciation, conservation and restoration, heritage, history and physical planning.

Suir River Café was created as a place to celebrate the river in all its forms and provide a space for all to renew their connection to the river. We facilitated a place where people could meet, be informed and exchange their ideas, stories and concerns. People were engaged by means of sharing and writing their own personal recollections of river stories, memories, events and inspirations. These were recorded by making use of physical maps using post-its, coloured strings and pins to locate and connect events and ideas along the river



corridor; and by means of a river timeline - all of which evolved to provide a clearer vision of what we would like

the river to be and what we could see it become.



We also created a river-inspired installation with water, greenery and sounds around which we invited people to freely express their impressions, wishes and intents for the river. We had fun with various arts - including making of dreamboats, meditative painting on river stones, raw river clay sculpting, fishy mobiles. We reconnected to river crafts and lore through learning of boats and boating, different ways of catching fish and making nets, willow basket and river rush weaving workshops. We learned about life in the river and on the river banks including threats to the biodiversity of life. We hosted a celebratory event of song, literature and poetry with Michael Coady and Compass Point.

The café model was surprisingly successful in helping to re-establish a stronger river culture and the creation of a renewed platform for people and groups who are friends of the river to continue to share their passion and vision and work together to devise projects and ways of utilising the river and realising its full potential as a major amenity and source of life and inspiration for all.

Bee 4 Biodiversity

in Denis Bourke Park

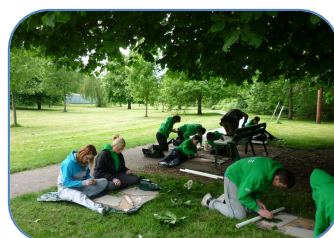
Biodiversity is the spice of life in Clonmel's riverside park

Denis Burke Park is a long narrow park of mature trees that skirts the banks of the River Suir in Clonmel. Due to flood relief works being carried out, the park was temporarily closed in order to widen the river bed and to erect flood relief walls. The rationale for this community art project was to draw more people into the park and make them more aware of the river wildlife.

Colourful tiled wildlife panels have been installed at the new entrance to the park. The undulating design of the panels echos the flow of the river. There are swans, owls, dippers, kingfishers, herons, salmon, trout, badgers, dragonflies, yellow flag and bullrushes all set into the undulating blues and greens. The sole pig placed on one of the cloud tiles remembers Denis Burke who set up a Bacon factory in Clonmel and who had donated the park to the local Council for the use of the people of the town.

Another part of the project involved running workshops with local schools and with community groups in the River

Cafe during Junction Festival, during Heritage Week and in various locations such as Clonmel Swimming Pool. There are many beautiful specimen trees in the park and these became the dominant theme in the workshops. The idea was to get as many people as possible to press a leaf into clay and when all these leaves are glazed and fired they would be placed in clusters on the inside wall of the park. The park has recently reopened and the leaf makers will get a chance to see their leaves installed and to see if they can recognise their own pieces.

The interactive Suir River map based site is up and running and you can search your area under 4 simple headings: **GO, WORK, PLAY and LIVE!**

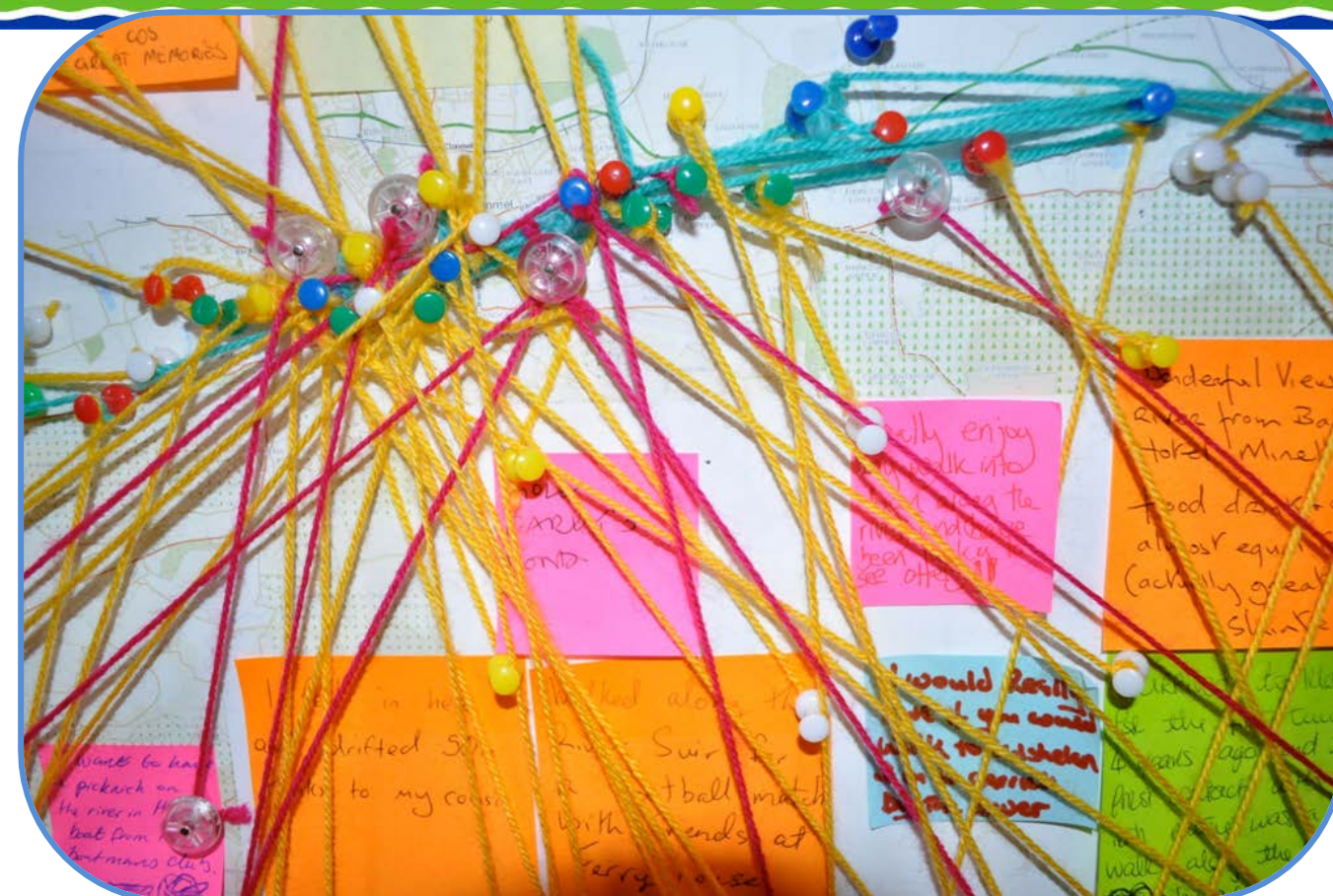
Data collected in the heritage surveying of the River Suir has been uploaded into an easily accessible format. 6 Pilot areas have been included in 2011 and it is hoped to further develop this in 2012.

Sites so far include:

Carrick-on-Suir – Industrial heritage, boating, tow path, town walls etc **Kilsheelan** – Walking, weirs, archaeology, fishing etc; **Clonmel** - Wildlife, Denis Bourke Park, quays, Suir Island etc **Glenbawn** –Woodland, Marlfield, Sandybanks etc; **Cahir** - Castle, architecture, bridges, ruins and railways etc; **Golden** – Athassel, bridges, fords, defences, mills and fish ponds.
